Top facts about the Seas around the UK

- To the east of the UK is the North Sea.
- To the **south** of the UK is the **English Channel**, separating it from **continental Europe**.
 - To the west is the Irish Sea and Atlantic Ocean.
 - An **island** is a **small body of land** surrounded by water.
- Continents are also surrounded by water, but because they are so big, they
 are not considered islands.
- The North Sea is a part of the Atlantic Ocean. The British coast has low cliffs and sandy beaches. The North Sea is one of the most dangerous seas in the world. It has wild storms and foggy winters.
